#### Overview



The California Youth Leadership Forum for Students with Disabilities (YLF) is a week-long residential program for sophomores, juniors, and seniors in high school with disabilities. Concentrated on pre-employment transition services, delegates engage in leadership activities focused on post-secondary education, career readiness, independent living, financial literacy, and self-advocacy.

During the program, eight to ten delegates work in small groups, supported by two peer counselors, one or two peer mentor(s) and two group assistants. Delegates work on activities that reinforce the key leadership goals and objectives of the program. Goals and objectives are to learn disability history and culture, resources available for career development and independence, and leadership skills. Each day has a theme, and scheduled activities reinforce that theme.

In addition to small group sessions, delegates participate in large group sessions which feature presentations and discussions from young adults with disabilities who have successfully transitioned out of high school and explored post-secondary education, work and career life, living independently, and self-advocacy. Delegates also have fun activities such as: a talent show, a college campus tour, a visit to the California state capitol, and a dance, which offer delegates the opportunity to socialize with fellow delegates and learn public speaking skills and interact in a fun atmosphere.

The YLF began in California in 1992 and has grown to a national program in over 30 states.



#### 2024 Highlights and Outcomes

For the first time since the COVID pandemic, YLF was held fully in person in 2024! From July 15 through July 20, delegates from all over California participated in the residential program at California State University, Sacramento.

Highlights of the 2024 program included the addition of new panels for delegates to hear shared experiences from young emerging leaders in addition to established leaders with disabilities. Additional activities surrounding Capitol Day included a robust panel on systems change hosted at the California Secretary of State Auditorium. Other highlights of the week included a mentoring luncheon hosted on campus, the return of an in-person resource fair, a new peer mentor role giving recent YLF Alumni the opportunity to continue to develop their leadership skills, new partnerships and supporters, and a film crew documenting the moments and memories of YLF 2024

This year we saw an increase in the number of youth interested in attending YLF with 150 students applying to the leadership program with 60 delegates selected and 50 attending.

Delegates participated in surveys to measure outcomes and growth in key concepts of self-advocacy and understanding of supports needed to live independently. Youth completed a before and after survey measuring their growth in areas such as disability history, self-advocacy, resources, career goals and supports needed, and independent living skills.

The top areas for new learning and growth for 2024 YLF delegates included having a better understanding about:

- The disability rights movement and its leaders.
- Feeling comfortable communicating with new people.
- · Being proud to have a disability.
- · The Americans with Disabilities Act.
- Knowing other young people with disabilities.
- Resources to reach educational goals.
- Having a strong connection to the Disability Community.

Additionally, delegates were asked open-ended questions to find what they learned most from the YLF program. Response themes related to gaining confidence with independence, and acceptance with being a member of the disability community, including growing friendships, were very high. Growth in knowledge on resources and advocacy abilities were also overwhelming.



## | 2024 | Demographics



In 2024, the majority of delegates identified as cisgender with a few identifying as non-binary/gender variant. Many delegates shared multiple identities within demographic categories like disability, race, and ethnicity. YLF achieved both disability, race and ethnicity diversity for 2024 with highest groups identifying as having developmental disabilities and being Hispanic/Latino, respectively. Most Delegates were seniors and juniors, with few who were sophomores. Delegates resided as south as San Diego County and as north as Tehama County.

In recent years, an effort has been made to recruit YLF alumni and staff closer to the age of delegates for more effective peer mentorship. Of 66 staff members, about 65% were either high-school age or in their 20s and 35% were in their 30s and 40s. 27 of the 66 staff members were alumni of the YLF program.

#### Year-Round Activities

In addition to the six-day summer program, additional year-round activities have been developed for YLF alumni in recent years. Virtual alumni workshops are held following YLF covering topics such as transition after high school, money management, apprenticeships/internships, career planning and work-based learning. Social activities and peer mentoring opportunities have also been offered including participating in regional events where YLF Alumni can serve as leaders and mentors to other participants. Additionally, all alumni are given the chance to participate in the national Association of Youth Leadership Forums events.







In collaboration with local regional partners, YLF has begun the implementation of regional YLF events. These weekend programs include many of the same curriculum topics covered in the longstanding summer program, but in a condensed manner. While not a prerequisite or feeder into the statewide summer program, regional YLF delegates will have the opportunity to apply to the summer program.

After holding the initial pilot program last year, Sacramento YLF regional partners held their second regional YLF event October 18-19. The event was held at Sacramento City College and targeted students, between the ages of 16 and 21. Nine students participated in the weekend event and learned about disability identity, goal setting strategies, and community engagement. A resource fair was also created where students could learn about services and resources in the community to help them reach their employment, education, and independent living goals.

Los Angeles partners hosted a regional YLF event in Los Angeles on Saturday, October 26. The event was held at Los Angeles Trade Technical College and targeted students between the ages of 16 and 21. Ten students participated in the event and learned about disability pride and goal setting strategies. Students heard from peers who have successfully graduated from high school and attended college, gained employment, and who are living independently in their communities.

There are plans to add a San Diego program in 2025 and talks will begin for another

region.
